CHOOSING YOUR COURSES

Welcome to the Senior Course Booklet for Campion College. Senior courses are designed for students from Year 10 to Year 13.

Semesters

All courses are offered as semesters. A semester is a half year course. A semester programme offers you, the student, greater flexibility in designing your course.

Most courses are stand-alone. However, for subjects that you wish to progress in you are advised to study the subject over two semesters.

Semester A runs from Thursday 4 February to Friday 18 June (17 weeks)

Semester B runs from Monday 21 June to Friday 12 November (17 weeks)

The Senior College timetable operates on a 30 period week. Each period is 50 minutes in duration and each course (subject) is timetabled for 4 x 50 minutes/week. The exception to this is Religious Education at Levels 1, 2 and 3 which is timetabled for 3 periods/week.

Students will generally undertake 7 courses per week to cover the 27 periods and there are 3 periods per week for administrative and curriculum support.

Levels

Courses are taught at one of five levels:

Level O – Foundation Courses:

These form the basis for higher learning. They also include courses of general interest available to all students.

Level 1 Courses:

In these courses, the majority of credits in assessment are at the NCEA 1 level.

Level 2 Courses:

In these courses, the majority of credits in assessment are at the NCEA 2 level.

Level 3 Courses:

In these courses, the majority of credits in assessment are at the NCEA 3 level.

Scholarship/Level 4 Courses:

These courses are set up individually for students with interest and ability. Students are generally invited into these courses although the opportunity also exists for students to apply for consideration.

All courses are identified by a code. The key to this code:

- 0 – Foundation
- 1 – Level 1
- 2 – Level 2

The course number for this subject at this level (ie 3 means this is the third course in Science at this level).

The semester that this course is offered in

- Odd Numbers – Semester A (Feb-June)
- Even Numbers – Semester B (June–Nov)

GETTING STARTED

The courses you choose are important for a variety of reasons:

- They may form the basis of your future career
- They may determine whether you achieve an NCEA qualification
- They may determine the courses available to you in future years.

An important starting point in choosing your courses is to first of all take a look at yourself. Ask yourself these questions:

- ‘Do I have a career to follow?’. If so, what subjects are required. If not, try and keep your options as wide as possible.
- ‘What subjects am I good at?’. Select courses that you can achieve in and that challenge you as well.
- ‘What subjects do I like?’. These are often the ones you are good at. Choosing courses you like increases the chances of achievement.
- ‘Is this subject accepted for University Entrance?’. While not all students go to university, it is important when planning for future years that you keep this option open. The College recommendation is to be studying at least three subjects that can be used for University Entrance (U.E.).
- ‘Are there some courses that I may want to take in future years that require me to have achieved in other courses first (prerequisite courses)?’

PLANNING YOUR COURSE

Year 10 Students

Most year 10 students will undertake a course of study at the Foundation level. Many of the Foundation courses are prerequisites for continuing study in that subject area. Students will study 7 courses in each semester. Over the year they will cover 14 courses in total.

Compulsory Courses for Year 10 Students

Religious Education	-	2 courses

The compulsory nature of subjects for Year 10 students is a legislative requirement to ensure students undertake a broad curriculum for the first 10 years of schooling.

Year 11 Students

Year 11 students can study courses from Foundation level to Level 3 providing they have met the appropriate prerequisites.

Compulsory Courses for Year 11 Students

Religious Education	-	2 courses
English	-	2 courses
Mathematics	-	1 course

To attain an NCEA Level 1 Certificate students need 8 Level 1 literacy credits gained from English Level 1 or Te Reo Level 1.

To attain an NCEA Level 1 Certificate students need at least 8 Level 1 numeracy credits gained from Mathematics Level 1. Furthermore, for students to attain University Entrance they need at least 14 numeracy credits gained from Mathematics Level 1 or higher.

Year 11 students will study 7 courses each semester. One of these courses can be a supervised senior study class. (STUD 21 or STUD 22).

Year 12 and Year 13 Students

Year 12 and year 13 students can study courses from Foundation level to level 3 providing they have met the appropriate prerequisites.

Compulsory Courses for Year 12 and 13 students

Religious Education - 2 courses

Highly Recommended: English or Te Reo Level 2. While English or Te Reo is not compulsory at Level 2, it is highly recommended for students to take. To gain entry to university, students need Level 2 literacy credits gained from English Level 2 or Te Reo Level 2.

Year 12 students will study 7 courses each semester.

One of these courses can be a study class (STUD 21 or STUD 22).

Year 13 students will study 6 courses each semester. Students at this level are not encouraged to take 7 courses due to the out of class demands for each course. The remaining time will be made up of unsupervised study providing students can meet the responsibilities that go with this. Those students who have difficulty with time management, may be required to remain in supervised study.

Supervised Senior Study STUD 21 & STUD 22

Year 11 and 12 students undertaking 6 courses in a semester will be placed in a supervised senior study class. The expectation is that students will bring homework, assignments or other study material to work on individually in a quiet, supervised environment. Access to computers, other technology or specialised resources may be available.

NCEA

The National Certificates in Educational Achievement (NCEA) is the main qualification studied for in the senior school.

1 **NCEA Level 1**

To achieve a Level 1 certificate students must attain at least 80 credits, with at least 8 credits in literacy and 8 credits in numeracy.

2 **NCEA Level 2**

To achieve a Level 2 certificate students must attain at least 60 Level 2 (or higher) credits.

3 **NCEA Level 3**

To achieve a Level 3 certificate students must attain at least 60 Level 3 (or higher) credits.

4 **University Entrance**

To qualify for entrance to a university in New Zealand students must obtain:

- A minimum of 42 credits at Level 3 or higher on the National Qualifications Framework, including a minimum of 14 credits at Level 3 or higher in each of two subjects from the approved subject list, with a further 14 credits at Level 3 or higher taken from no more than two additional domains on the National Qualifications framework or approved subjects.
- A minimum of 14 credits at Level 1 (or higher) in Mathematics on the National Qualifications Framework.
- A minimum of 8 credits at Level 2 (or higher) in English or Te Reo; 4 credits must be in Reading and 4 credits must be in Writing. The literacy credits will be selected from a schedule of approved achievement standards and unit standards.

Many university courses, however, are more particular in who they choose. Often merit or excellence grades are required to enter some courses. Attendance at an interview may also be required.

5 **Scholarship**

Scholarship papers are designed to extend the best secondary students in the country and enable top scholars to be acknowledged. Students will be able to enter one or more scholarship assessments as well as their Level 3 assessments. A student sitting three scholarship papers may be eligible for the Scholarship (Level 4) qualification.

PERSONALISED PROGRAMMES

The guidelines in this booklet are designed to provide a general framework for all students and staff to work within. Sometimes a subject is not listed that forms an important part of a student's interest area. We are able to design programmes to meet specific requests and every effort is made to cater for the individual needs of each student.

If there is a course or activity you would like to take as part of your programme which is not listed, please see one of the Deputy Principals or the Transition staff.

PREREQUISITES TO COURSES

Most courses have prerequisites that must be undertaken before progression into the course. This reduces the risk of a student not being able to cope with the expectations of a course.

The prerequisite for each course is listed in the details for each course that follow.

Foundation Level Courses

There are no prerequisites for Year 10 students undertaking Foundation level courses.

Level 1 Courses

In general a satisfactory effort at Foundation Level is the prerequisites for Year 11 students undertaking Level 1 courses. Courses requiring a specific prerequisite will have this detailed in the description for that course.

Level 2 Courses

In general a satisfactory effort at Level 1 is the prerequisites for Year 12 students undertaking Level 2 courses. Courses requiring a specific prerequisite will have this detailed in the description for that course.

Level 3 Courses

In general a satisfactory effort at Level 2 is the prerequisites for Year 12 students undertaking Level 3 courses. Courses requiring a specific prerequisite will have this detailed in the description for that course.

When a student does not meet the prerequisite for a course they wish to take, they should, in the first instance, discuss this with the relevant Head of Curriculum (H.O.C.) The student can further discuss their proposed programme with their Learning Mentor, who will liaise with Senior Management if necessary.

MULTILEVEL STUDY

Students may study at any level as long as they meet the prerequisites for the course.

VIABILITY OF COURSES

Where the number of students choosing a particular subject are low other providers will be considered, particularly Distance Learning options. If this is not viable students will be guided into other selections.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS & PARENTS

This is a guide to the criteria and information students need to be aware of for the successful completion of courses and the College rules governing the NCEA system. It is important that you read and understand the following information.

ATTENDANCE

All students must maintain a satisfactory attendance from the commencement of the course until the completion date for the course.

All absences must be explained, by a note or phone call from your parents/guardians.

At Campion College an attendance rate of 90% or more is required for you to be considered to have met attendance requirements. In a few special circumstances, dispensation from this requirement may be given. Talk to the Principal's Nominee if you are in doubt.

ABSENCE FROM AN ASSESSMENT

Legitimate Absences: a school approved exchange, trip, or official work experience, or where the student is ill.

If you are absent from school due to illness and you miss an assessment your parents/guardians should, if possible, ring the school office on the day of your absence. You will need to bring a note from your parents/guardians and give it to the Principal's Nominee, on your first day back in class. Your Form Teacher and Subject Teacher will be informed as to the legitimacy of your absence.

A medical certificate may be required for absences from a significant assessment or if you are away for three days or more consecutively, or if you are beginning to show a pattern of missing assessments or school. The Principal's Nominee will advise if you need to provide a medical certificate for absences.

If you know in advance that you are going to be absent from school, a request for leave **in writing** to the Principal's Nominee in advance is required from your parents/guardians.

For any legitimate absences your subject teacher may choose to:

- (i) Give you the assessment on the day of your return to class
- (ii) Give you an equivalent assessment or
- (iii) Give you an aggregate mark.

ABSENCES NOT CONSIDERED TO BE LEGITIMATE

(eg: truancy, leave for overseas trips, etc)

If your absence from school is because of truancy or for activities that are not directly endorsed by the College then any assessments missed will result in a 'Not Achieved' grade.

FURTHER ASSESSMENT OPPORTUNITY

It is the policy of Campion College to give students the opportunity for reassessment in an internally assessed achievement standard or unit standard where this is practical and appropriate.

Where reassessment is indicated it is expected that only one reassessment opportunity is provided. Where a teacher believes that more reassessment opportunities are in the interest of the students and are appropriate to the course these may be provided.

Where a student has missed an assessment and has no reasonable excuse for missing they will not have the opportunity for reassessment where this offered.

LATE ASSESSMENTS

If there is a genuine problem, then before the due date you must seek an extension from your teacher and negotiate a new date.

If an extension is requested for an assessment, the subject teacher may request to see work to date. If insufficient effort has been made to start the assessment, an extension may be refused by the teacher.

If the assessment falls due on the day of a school-based trip and you are aware in advance of the trip, then you must arrange for the assessment to be handed in before or on the date or a new date negotiated. Otherwise the assessment will be regarded as late. Assessments handed in late for non-approved reasons will result in a grade of “not achieved”.

LOSS OF WORK

In the event that your work, due to legitimate reasons is lost, this must immediately be reported to your Subject Teacher and the Principal’s Nominee. Your parents/guardians will also need to contact the college and explain the circumstances of the loss. A discussion will take place to ascertain the best option in each individual case.

AUTHENTICATION OF STUDENT WORK

All work you do must be your own. Where you get assistance from others, the extent of this help must be acknowledged in writing by you and given to your subject teacher. If you are in doubt about how much help you can receive, see your teacher.

Any evidence of cheating, copying or collusion in tests and/or assessments may result in a grade of “not achieved” for that assessment for all parties involved.

BREACHES OF THE RULES

Any breach of rules such as misconduct relating to assessments, school examinations assisting or hindering others, plagiarism or cheating will be dealt with by the Principal’s Nominee. If a breach of the rules is evident then a grade of ‘Not achieved’ will be recorded.

APPEAL PROCESS

There is a system of appeal for students to appeal any assessment decision relating to grades, cheating, plagiarism or dishonest practice. The procedure is as follows:

- 1 An Appeal form will be obtained from the office.
- 2 The appeal will be recorded and signed by the student and the Principal's Nominee.
- 3 The appeal will be discussed with the teacher/person involved and/or the HOC of the subject.
- 4 The final decision will be made by the Principal's Nominee.
- 5 The appeal will be kept on file by the Principal's Nominee.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT CONDITIONS

Students who have an identified permanent or long term condition and receive assistance through specialised programmes or Teacher Aide support will be considered for special assessment conditions. This should be discussed with the Learning Mentor who will make a recommendation to the Principal's Nominee.

COMPASSIONATE CONSIDERATION FOR EXTERNAL EXAMS

Students may apply for compassionate consideration during the external exams should they be too sick to study and/or attend the exam or the death of a close relative occurs. There are strict rules covering the application for compassionate consideration and you may wish to contact the Principal's Nominee to discuss. Should you consider you are entitled to compassionate consideration an application form is available at the office and needs to be filled in and returned to the Principal's Nominee.

PRIVACY

Your rights as a student under the Privacy Act 1993.

Where the College collects personal information from a student it will take steps to ensure that the individual concerned is aware: that the information is being collected, the purpose for which the information is being collected and who the information is going to. No information will be collected by unlawful, unfair or unreasonably intrusive means.

Personal information is collected and stored in the student's records or with the Learning Mentors. These are kept in a secure, locked cabinet or room. Data held by heads of curriculum areas, Learning Mentors and teachers regarding student assessments, behaviour issues, goal setting strategies will be stored in a secure cabinet which is not accessible to other students. Information retained by individual teachers about students will not be accessible to other students. Individual assessment data and student learning programmes will be kept confidential to the student concerned.

Information on students may not be used for the purpose other than for which it was collected. Any exception to this would be noted by the Management of the College.

COURSE CHOICE TIMELINE

Sept/Oct 2009	Students receive Senior Course booklet and make their initial selections for Semester A and Semester B.
Sept/Oct 2009	Parents and Students attend interviews with Learning Mentors to discuss their learning plan and course selection for 2008.
Nov/Dec 2009	A draft timetable is developed. The courses being offered in each semester and option lines finalised. This is based on the 'best fit' from student initial selections.
Tuesday 2 February 2010	Confirmation of Courses. Students and Parents meet with Learning Mentors (or Form Teachers) and confirm their learning plan and course selection for both semesters based on the draft timetable.
May 30, 2010	Last day for students to apply for course changes for Semester B 2007
Sept/Oct 2010	Students receive Senior Course Booklet for 2010 and make their initial selections for Semester A and Semester B.

FOUNDATION COURSES

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION 01 RELG 01

CONTENT:

This course covers the following topics:

- Developing Christian Spirituality
- The Teachings of Jesus
- Inspiring Men & Women

During this course students will develop an understanding of why we pray and ways to pray. They will gain an understanding of the content and manner of Jesus' teachings and the implications for his own time and today. There will be a focus on love (aroha) as the foundation of Jesus' teaching. Part of the course will look at the significance of inspiring men and women in Scripture and in Church history and why we honour saints.

ASSESSMENT:

NZQA Internal Assessment:

US 6039 (v4) Developing Christian Spirituality.....2 credits

Campion Assessment requiring course completion and attendance is a requirement.

PREREQUISITES: Nil

COST: \$25 for the purchase of NRSV Bible (if not previously purchased through the College).

LEVEL 1 COURSE (all year)

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION 11/12 RELG 11 RELG 12

CONTENT:

This course covers the following topics:

- Understanding the New Testament – The Gospel Story
- The Reformation and Beyond
- Conscience, Morality & Values

The course provides students with the opportunity to confront and cope with the challenge of accepting responsibility for their personal lives.

ASSESSMENT:

NZQA Internal Assessment:

AS 90816 (v1) Gospel Story6 credits
AS 90817 (v1) The Reformation.....6 credits
AS 90818 (v1) Conscience, Morality & Values.....6 credits

PREREQUISITES:

Satisfactory completion of RELG 01 and RELG 02.

COST: \$25 for the purchase of NRSV Bible (if not previously purchased through the College).

STATIONERY: Pack of colouring pencils
felt pens 1 glue stick
1 pair of scissors
1 x 1B8 Exercise Book

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION 02 RELG 02

CONTENT:

This course covers the following topics:

- Understanding Religion
- Health issues facing teens

The first part of this course focuses on the significance of the Eucharist and the Catholic festival calendar. In the latter part of this semester, students will increase their awareness of health issues facing teenagers. In particular, the effects of alcohol, road safety and sexuality issues will be examined. The sexuality programme will involve a one-day retreat. This course is presented from an underlying Christian perspective.

Campion Assessment requiring course completion and attendance is a requirement.

PREREQUISITES: Nil

LEVEL 2 COURSES (all year)

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION 21/22 RELG 21 RELG 22

CONTENT:

This course covers the following topics:

- Loss, Death and Grief
- Justice and Peace
- Biblical Studies

Students will have the opportunity to reflect on:

- Their own spiritual journey while examining the significances of a key belief within 2 religious traditions.
- Developing an appreciation of social justice while examining a contemporary issue.
- The general background of Scripture with an opportunity for detailed study of particular books of the New Testament.

AS 90820 (v1) Biblical Studies.....6 credits
AS 90822 (v1) Justice and Peace.....6 credits
AS 90823 (v1) Law, Death & Grief.....6 credits

LITURGY LEADERSHIP 23	RELG 23
CONTENT: This is a practical course for those wanting to learn more about liturgy. There is an opportunity to become involved in Sunday Masses and College liturgies. Students are expected to lead public prayer, present yourself as a leader in a worship service, read aloud from the bible, be involved with music for liturgy.	
ASSESSMENT: NZQA Internal Assessment: US 6048 (v5) Level 1 2 credits	
PREREQUISITES: Nil. This course is open to all students in Years 11, 12 and 13.	
COST: \$25 for the purchase of NRSV Bible (if not previously purchased through the College.)	
STATIONERY: Pack of colouring pencils felt pens 1 glue stick 1 pair of scissors 1 x 1B8 Exercise Book	

LEVEL 3 COURSE (semester A)

MASS PARTICIPATION 24	RELG 24
CONTENT: This course offers students the opportunity to go to Mass and reflect on the significance of the Mass in our daily lives. Those who wish can focus on the Mass in Maori. Students are expected to take an active role in Parish Masses. Students would attend 3 Masses per week and meet on a regular basis with the Parish Priest to discuss aspects of readings and the Mass.	
ASSESSMENT: End of Topic Assignment	
PREREQUISITES: Nil. This course is open to all students in Years 11, 12 and 13.	
COST: \$25 for the purchase of NRSV Bible (if not previously purchased through the College.)	
STATIONERY: Pack of colouring pencils felt pens 1 glue stick 1 pair of scissors 1 x 1B8 Exercise Book	

LEVEL 3 COURSE (all year)

THEOLOGY AT OTAGO 33	RELG 33
Early Christianity	
CONTENT: This is a Year 1 Otago University course. It guides students through the first 600 years of Christianity. It explores how the Christian faith grew from a small group of followers in a backwater of the civilised world to become the official religion of the Roman Empire. The course consists of seven evening teleconferences, each one running for two hours along with class time. This programme is for students who want the academic and theological challenge that a university course provides. Students will need to meet academic standard to remain in this course.	
ASSESSMENT: Otago University semester assessment consisting of two essays comprising 30% of the final mark and a final three hour exam at the end of the semester.	
PREREQUISITES: Completion of RELG 11 or RELG 21 to a high level. All participants need to discuss requirements with D.R.S. before acceptance into the course.	
COST: \$25 for the purchase of NRSV Bible (if not previously purchased through the College).

CONTENT: This course covers the following topics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ethics and Religion • Religion, sects and cults • Making meaning of our world The topics are spread over the two semesters. BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY TRAINING PROGRAMME.

Technology Hard Materials at Level 1,2 and 3 will offer the building and construction industry training programme. This programme leads to jobs in building and allied trades. Students are advised to check that they are entered for the required standards and to check the web site www.constructionzone.co.nz and information on the next page of this booklet for requirements of the level one and level two certificates.

BConstructive is a hands-on qualification. It is an innovative, practical and multi-disciplinary programme for students, providing the skills and knowledge to springboard into any career in the construction industry.

The BConstructive programme is primarily workshop based. Rather than focusing on any one trade the programme builds skills and an understanding of all trades in the construction industry. It also develops literacy, numeracy and communication skills and has close links with the NCEA and Technology curriculums.

In 2010 Campion College will offer the two qualifications currently available in the BConstructive programme they are:

- National Certificate in Building, Construction and Allied Trades Skills Level 1
- National Certificate in Building, Construction and Allied Trades Skills Level 2

Students who participate in the BConstructive programme can go on to consider apprenticeships in a variety of trades such as: building, construction, plumbing, drainlaying, roofing, gasfitting, painting and decorating, infrastructure, flooring and joinery. The programme also provides a good base for students who would like to enter other related areas of the construction industry such as architecture, quantity surveying and estimating. Students in Year 10 would be advised to sign up for TECH01 and TECH02 in 2010 with a view to entering the BCAT programme in 2011.

Level One BConstructive Certificate consists of 40 credits of level 1 and 2 credits made up as follows.

Level 3 BConstructive course will be researched and developed during 2010 and will look to offer standards that allow students to move into areas of the construction industry.
